



Curriculum

Our vision is for all of our students to have high aspirations, and to be confident, independent and resilient individuals. They will achieve excellence and become life-long learners, well prepared for the modern workplace. This will lead them to be responsible, respectful and active citizens who can make a positive contribution to society.

In years 7-9 students will study:

- Art
- Design and Technology
- Drama
- · English
- French
- Geography
- History

- ICT
- Mathematics
- Music
- Physical Education
- Religious Education
- Science
- Spanish

During Year 9 we advise students about their options for education between the ages of 14 and 19, and undertake career planning activities. We invite parents to be part of the decision making process. Students who achieve the appropriate qualifications at GCSE to study A-levels or a vocational qualification will, at 16, be able to apply to the Redhill Sixth Form Centre.

In years 10-11 all students continue to study:

- English
- English Literature
- Mathematics
- Physical Education (non-examined)
- Religious Education
- Science
- At least one additional EBacc subject

Students then have the opportunity to select four subjects from the following options:

High Standards

The academy takes great pride in the appearance and the behaviour of its students and we welcome the co-operation of parents in this matter. We all need to work together to maintain these high standards.

Uniform at The Oakwood Academy includes:

- Grey blazer with Oakwood logo
- Tie
- Black trousers with Oakwood logo
- School skirt
- School jumper with Oakwood logo
- White shirt with top collar button
- Shoes

School shoes must be plain black, made of a conventional material which can be polished, without coloured logos, tags and soles. Trainer style shoes are not permitted.

The school does not allow jewellery to be worn (ie rings and necklaces). It will, however, accept the wearing of one small stud in each ear but will not accept responsibility for it when it must be removed for sport. Facial piercings are not acceptable on grounds of health and safety. Students who break the rule and wear jewellery will be told to remove it. Jewellery may well be confiscated for student/parental collection.

- Plain black shoes Not boots or trainers
- Plain black socks
- Black tights or black socks in warm weather for girls
- School coat, plain in colour Large logos, sports jackets, denim jackets, leather jackets, body warmers & hoodies are all **not** permitted.

Hairstyles

Extreme hairstyles are not permitted this includes but is not limited to vivid colours, very short shaved hair, tramlines and patterns.

Make up and nails

Make up should not be seen. False nails or excessively long natural nails and false eyelashes are not permitted at any time and are considered a health and safety issue.

Headwear

Baseball caps are not permitted to be worn in school or on the school premises. Sensible headwear may be worn in inclement weather but must not be worn inside the buildings. Headwear worn for religious reasons must be plain black.



OAKWOOD STUDENTS ARE...



ON TIME

Students are on school site for 8:40am and in classrooms by 8:45am. Oakwood students attend school each day and are always on time for lessons.



ACHIEVING HIGHLYStudents are achieving target grades in assessments and are successful in school events and activities, sports teams, house competitions and earning house points.



KIND

Oakwood students are kind to others both in and out of school. They are respectful to staff at all times and promote a positive behaviour culture around school and in the community.



WORKING HARD

Oakwood students work hard, try their best in all lessons, enthusiastically engage in all support and tutor sessions and support peers in their learning.



ORGANISED

Students always wear the correct school uniform and bring the correct PE kit and relevant equipment to all lessons. They always have their timetable, reading book and uniform card to hand.

Students at our school participate in co-curricular activities, achieve Pledge awards and engage in all aspects of school life including Leadership, Oakwood Plus and visits.



DRIVEn

Students should show **D**emocratic communication, are Responsible for their actions, practice Independence in their learning, express positive Values and demonstrate Equality in the way they treat others.



Admissions Policy

Applications to year 7 are managed through the local authority.

Where the number of applications for admission exceeds the number of places available, the following criteria will be applied in the order set out below, to decide which children to admit:

- 1. Looked after children or children who have been previously looked after
- 2. Children who, at the time of application, will have a brother or sister attending the school
- **3.** Other children who live in the catchment area at the closing date of application

4. Other children who live outside the catchment area at the closing date of application

If applications exceed the number of places available, the school will operate a waiting list, in which priority for places will be given on the basis of this criteria.

Students who have a statement of special education needs and where the school is named in the child's statement, will be admitted.

Measuring distance

In the event of over-subscription within any criteria, preference will be given to children who live nearest to the school as the crow flies. Distances are measured from the entrance to the child's home to the principal entrance to the main administrative building of the school by the local authority which currently uses a computerised measuring system.

In year admissions

In year applications need to be made through the Local Authority. If a place is not available in the year group for which a student applies, the application will be refused and placed on the waiting list. Names are placed on the waiting list in the rank order of our published over-subscription criteria, not in the date order by which they are received. Parents have the right of appeal to the refusal of a place.



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
