

GDPR PRIVACY NOTICE FOR PARENTS/CARERS Use of your child's personal data.

Primary/students aged 12 and under

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1. Introduction

Under UK data protection law, individuals have a right to be informed about how our school, and the multi-academy trust we are part of, uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing 'privacy notices' (sometimes called 'fair processing notices') to individuals where we are processing their personal data.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about **pupils at our school**.

This privacy notice applies while we believe your child is not capable of understanding and exercising their own data protection rights.

Once your child is able to understand their rights over their own data (generally considered to be age 13, but this has to be considered on a case-by-case basis), you should instead refer to our privacy notice for pupils to see what rights they have over their own personal data. A copy of this policy can be located on the school's website.

2. The personal data we hold

Personal data that we may collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) about your child includes, but is not restricted to:

- > Contact details, contact preferences, date of birth, identification documents
- > Results of internal assessments and externally set tests
- > Pupil and curricular records
- > Exclusion information
- > Attendance information
- > Safeguarding information
- > Details of any support received, including care packages, plans and support providers
- ➤ Information about their use of our information and communication systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers)

We may also collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) information about your child that falls into 'special categories' of more sensitive personal data. This includes, but is not restricted to:

Information about any medical conditions we need to be aware of, including physical and mental health

- > Photographs and CCTV images captured in school
- ➤ Information about characteristics, such as ethnic background or special educational needs
- > Free School Meals eligibility

We may also hold data about your child that we have received from other organisations, including other schools or trusts, and social services.

3. Why we use this data

We use the data listed above to:

- a) Fulfil our statutory obligations to safeguard and protect students and vulnerable people
- b) Support pupil learning
- c) Monitor and report on pupil progress
- d) Provide appropriate pastoral care
- e) Protect pupil welfare
- f) Assess the quality of our services
- g) Administer admissions waiting lists
- h) Carry out research
- i) Comply with the law regarding data sharing
- j) Make sure our information and communication systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers) are used appropriately, legally and safely

3.1 Use of your child's personal data for marketing purposes

Where you have given us consent to do so, we may send your child marketing information by email or text promoting school events, campaigns, charitable causes or services that may be of interest to them.

You can withdraw consent or 'opt out' of receiving these emails and/or texts at any time by clicking on the 'Unsubscribe' link at the bottom of any such communication, or by contacting us (see 'Contact us' below).

3.2 Use of your child's personal data in automated decision making and profiling

We do not currently process any pupils' personal data through automated decision making or profiling. If this changes in the future, we will amend any relevant privacy notices in order to explain the processing to you, including your right to object to it.

3.3 Use of your child's personal data for filtering and monitoring purposes

While your child is in our school, we may monitor their use of our information and communication systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers). We do this so that we can:

- > Comply with health and safety and other legal obligations
- > Comply with our policies (e.g. child protection policy, IT acceptable use policy) and our legal obligations
- > Keep our network(s) and devices safe from unauthorised access, and prevent malicious software from harming our network(s)

4. Our lawful basis for using this data

We will only collect and use your information when the law allows us to. We need to establish a 'lawful basis' to do this, which falls under Article 6 and Article 9 of the GDPR (General Data Protection Regulation). This enables the Trust to process information under the Education Act 1996 and Regulation 5 of the Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013 and the Education Act 2005.

Where you have given your consent for us to use your child's information, you may take back this consent at any time. We'll make this clear when requesting consent and explain how you would go about withdrawing consent if you wish to.

4.1 Our basis for using special category data

For 'special category' data (more sensitive personal information), we only collect and use it when we have both a lawful basis, as set out above, and 1 of the following conditions for processing as set out in UK data protection law:

- > We have got your explicit consent to use your child's information in a certain way
- > We need to use your child's information under employment, social security or social protection law
- > We need to protect an individual's vital interests (i.e. protect your child's life or someone else's life), in situations where you're physically or legally incapable of giving consent
- The information has already been made obviously public by you or your child
- > We need to use it to make or defend against legal claims
- > We need to use it for reasons of substantial public interest as defined in legislation
- > We need to use it for health or social care purposes, and it's used by, or under the direction of, a professional obliged to confidentiality under law

- > We need to use it for public health reasons, and it's used by, or under the direction of, a professional obliged to confidentiality under law
- > We need to use it for archiving purposes, scientific or historical research purposes, or for statistical purposes, and the use is in the public interest

For criminal offence data, we will only collect and use it when we have both a lawful basis, as set out above, and a condition for processing as set out in UK data protection law. Conditions include:

- > We have obtained your consent to use it in a specific way
- > We need to protect an individual's vital interests (i.e. protect your child's life or someone else's life), in situations where you're physically or legally incapable of giving consent
- The data concerned has already been made obviously public by you or your child
- > We need to use it as part of legal proceedings, to obtain legal advice, or to make or defend against legal claims
- > We need to use it for reasons of substantial public interest as defined in legislation

5. Collecting this data

While the majority of information we collect about your child is mandatory, there is some information that can be provided voluntarily.

Whenever we seek to collect information from you, we make it clear whether you must provide this information (and if so, what the possible consequences are of not complying), or whether you have a choice.

Most of the data we hold about your child will come from you, but we may also hold data about your child from:

- > Local authorities
- Government departments or agencies
- > Police forces, courts or tribunals

6. How we store this data

We keep personal information about your child while they are attending our school. We may also keep it beyond their attendance at our school if this is necessary. Our Data Management Policy and Retention Schedule (which are published on the Trust and Academy websites) sets out how long we keep information about pupils

We have put in place appropriate security measures to prevent your child's personal information from being accidentally lost, used or accessed in an unauthorised way, altered or disclosed.

We will dispose of your child's personal data securely when we no longer need it.

7. Who we share data with

We do not share information about your child with any third party without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Where it is legally required, or necessary (and it complies with UK data protection law), we may share personal information about your child with:

- ➤ Our local authority, [name of local authority] to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding concerns and information about exclusions
- > Government departments or agencies
- Our youth support services provider
- > Our regulator, Ofsted
- > Suppliers and service providers:
 - List the specific types of providers (e.g. catering/FM providers, filtering and monitoring)
- > Financial organisations
- > Our auditors
- > Survey and research organisations
- > Health authorities
- > Security organisations
- > Health and social welfare organisations
- > Professional advisers and consultants
- Charities and voluntary organisations
- > Police forces, courts or tribunals

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National Pupil Database

We are required to provide information about pupils to the Department for Education as part of statutory data collections such as the school census [if applicable, add: and early years census].

Some of this information is then stored in the <u>National Pupil Database</u> (NPD), which is owned and managed by the Department for Education and provides evidence on school performance to inform research.

The database is held electronically so it can easily be turned into statistics. The information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and exam boards.

The Department for Education may share information from the NPD with third parties, such as other organisations which promote children's education or wellbeing in England. These third parties must agree to strict terms and conditions about how they will use the data.

7.1 Immunisations and Vaccinations

The Department for Education issued guidance (December 2023) explaining that schools must share information with the School Age Immunisation Services (SAIS), who are commissioned by NHS England to deliver school-based immunisation programmes. Information that is to be shared on request includes a list of eligible children and young people and their parent or carer's contact details to the SAIS team.

The immunisation process is a matter of consent between the pupil, parent and/or carer and the SAIS provider. The school do not take any active role in the process. The obligation to share data is within pubic task and does not rely upon consent. It is mandatory for the school to share this information.

8. Your rights

8.1 How to access personal information that we hold about your child

You have a right to make a 'subject access request' to gain access to personal information that we hold about your child.

If you make a subject access request, and if we do hold information about your child, we will (subject to any exemptions that apply):

- > Give you a description of it
- > Tell you why we are holding and processing it, and how long we will keep it for
- > Explain where we got it from, if not from you
- > Tell you who it has been, or will be, shared with
- > Let you know whether any automated decision-making is being applied to the data, and any consequences of this
- Give you a copy of the information in an intelligible form

You may also have the right for your child's personal information to be transmitted electronically to another organisation in certain circumstances.

If you would like to make a request, please contact us (see 'Contact us' below).

If relevant to the school, add: Once your child is able to understand their rights over their own data (generally considered to be age 13, but this has to be considered on a case-by-case basis), we will need to obtain consent from your child for you to make a subject access request on their behalf.

8.2 Your right to access your child's educational record

You may wish to make a subject access request to gain access to personal information that we hold about your child.

If you make a subject access request, and we do hold the information being requested, we will provide the information under General Data Protection Regulations, unless we have a good reason why we shouldn't.

Details of how to make a Subject Access Request can be found within the Data Protection Policy, a copy of which is published on the school's website.

8.3 Your other rights regarding your child's data

Under UK data protection law, you have certain rights regarding how your child's personal data is used and kept safe. For example, you have the right to:

- Object to our use of your child's personal data
- > Prevent your child's data being used to send direct marketing
- > Object to and challenge the use of your child's personal data for decisions being taken by automated means (by a computer or machine, rather than by a person)
- In certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data corrected
- ➤ In certain circumstances, have the personal data we hold about your child deleted or destroyed, or restrict its processing
- > Withdraw your consent, where you previously provided it for the collection, processing and transfer of your child's personal data for a specific purpose
- In certain circumstances, be notified of a data breach
- Make a complaint to the Information Commissioner's Office
- Claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the data protection regulations

9. Complaints

We take any complaints about our collection and use of personal information very seriously.

If you think that our collection or use of personal information is unfair, misleading or inappropriate, or have any other concern about our data processing, please raise this with us in the first instance.
